




Two Hundred and Eighty








News from The Dark Furry One



Resident Feature Lieutenant Colonel Duncan R Beat LVO ARCM



A Musical World


Lieutenant Colonel Duncan Beat has music running through his veins. His father Charles was Bandmaster of the Argyle & Sutherland Highlanders Band and so, with the background of music and a natural born talent it seemed inevitable that the young Duncan Beat would eventually end up in this world.

In 1946, aged 15, he joined The Royal Artillery to start his military career, before specialising in his glittering musical vocation with the army.

Kneller Hall - The Royal Military School of Music, Twickenham

By 1958 he embarked on his training to become a Bandmaster.

A hint of things to come during his time at the School he won the Directors' Prize for Conducting with his Band of The Royal Artillery Woolwich.



The Black Watch

In 1959 he became Bandmaster of The Black Watch, stationed for periods of time in Cyprus, Germany and the UK. His time with The Black Watch took him around the Globe on various tours, meeting many of the World's leading royalties, celebrities and dignitaries of that time. One interesting time in his career was when his Band toured the US in 1963; he played on the lawn of the White House, entertaining President Kennedy, the week before the President's assassination.

Other Key Career Dates

1965-1968 - Highland Brigade, Aberdeen

1968-1974 - Royal Army Ordnance Corps

1974-1982 - Scots Guards, as Director of Music

Kneller Hall

From 1982 to 1988 Duncan took up his post as Director of Music and Chief Instructor.

We have been lucky enough to hear from Marion, Duncan's secretary at Kneller, who recalls that the office was always busy.

Some of his regular engagements that took place were:

- The Wembley Pageant, featuring the massed bands.
- He conducted the Kneller Hall Fanfare Trumpeters at the annual inspection of the Chelsea Pensioners by a member of the Royal Family at The Royal Hospital Chelsea's Founder's Day. (An event that The Royal Cambridge Home is lucky enough to be invited to each year.)
- Either Duncan or the School Bandmaster would conduct the Fanfare Trumpeters at the Garter Ceremony at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle every year.
- The annual Summer Garden Concerts were held at Kneller Hall, which were open to the public by tickets.





Other key engagements were the Edinburgh Tattoo and The Wembley Pageant.

One of Duncan's favourite engagements was the Children's Concert. Local schools would attend and also special needs children brought by the Sunshine Coaches, belonging to The Royal Variety Club. Duncan knew how to get the children involved surrounded by a lot of excitement.

On a personal note, Marion remembers her time working with Duncan with great fondness and says that he was a wonderful person to work for. They had a lot of fun. When Duncan retired from the Army, the School held a "palm court" tea party with a small string ensemble. Duncan fetched his violin and joined in as well!

The Metropolitan Police Band

After retiring from the Army, Duncan went on to become Director of Music at The Metropolitan Police Band for the period 1988-1997. He carried out lots of engagements, including many Buckingham Palace Garden Parties. He knew the Queen and in fact at one party, Her Majesty approached Duncan and asked why on earth he was playing in a plain blue uniform (The Met Police Band) and not the glorious red colours of the Scots Guards that she was used to seeing him in!

The Royal Cambridge Home

We are lucky enough to have Duncan here as one of our residents at the Home. He regularly practices with the Band of The Royal Hospital Chelsea In Pensioners' Band on Thursday mornings and joins the Band three times a year when they come over and play for us, led by Major Philip Shannon, who was one of Duncan's pupils during his time at Kneller Hall.





Thanks to Mary and Kim, Duncan's wife and daughter and also Marion, for supplying background material and memories of her time working with Duncan as his Secretary.
